STUDENTS THRIVE AT CAMP ENTERPRISE BUSINESS WORKSHOP

Six senior students from Our Lady of Mount Carmel had the exciting opportunity to attend Camp Enterprise, a dynamic business-focused workshop held at the University of Toronto's Mississauga campus from Wednesday, May 14 to Saturday, May 17. This incredible experience was made possible thanks to the generous sponsorship of the Rotary Club of Mississauga Meadowvale.

Camp Enterprise, which first began with the Rotary Club of Columbus, Ohio, and was introduced to Canada in 1976 by the Rotary Club of Toronto, is a three-day program designed to give high school seniors hands-on exposure to leadership, entrepreneurship, and teamwork. The camp features expert-led discussions, interactive workshops, and business simulations—all aimed at helping students deepen their understanding of the business world.



During the camp, students got a taste of university life by staying in dorms and exploring the UTM campus. They also connected with peers from other Mississauga high schools, forging friendships and professional connections with students who share a passion for business and innovation. One of the highlights included a fast-paced business challenge, where students collaborated in teams to build and present a business model—all within just five hours.

"I made connections that will carry on into the future," said Nia Pascual, one of Mount Carmel's student attendees. "The Rotary Club members and guest presenters ensured that we were all understanding each new concept and effectively captivated each of us throughout their presentations."

Throughout the experience, students discovered their strengths and learned to take on roles that suited their unique skills. Whether leading a team, presenting a pitch, or collaborating behind the scenes, each student found a place to shine. The camp emphasized the value of networking, communication, and resilience—skills essential to any future business leader.

Camp Enterprise proved to be more than just a workshop. It was a transformative experience where our Mount Carmel students gained confidence, knowledge, and a clearer vision for their future paths in business and leadership.















MRS. RAMNARAIN'S YEAR IN REVIEW


HOSA 2025















COOPERATIVE EDUCATION






Accelerated Reader


End of Year Celebration


















CONGRATULATIONS TO THE MOUNT CARMEL TRACK & FIELD TEAM ON A SUCCESSFUL SEASON



2025 ROPSSAA BASEBALL CHAMPIONS - GOLD

The Boys Varsity Baseball team concluded the 2025 season by winning the ROPSSAA Championship in a dramatic, extra-inning battle against St. Martin, where the lead changed hands several times.

The season started in rough fashion with a lopsided loss to St. Martin in the season-opening game, ll-l. Although the team was young—having graduated a large number of players the previous season—the boys did not let this deter them and never lost hope in themselves or each other.

Their next meeting showcased a different team and a different outcome. Led by stellar pitching from Grade 10 student Jashan Sethi, who pitched a complete game, Mount Carmel emerged with a 9-3 win over the same St. Martin team. This dominating victory invigorated the team and fostered a new level of confidence.

The regular season ended on a high note with a three-game winning streak, a second-place overall finish, and a berth in the ROPSSAA Championship final against the top-ranked St. Martin team.


Led by team captain, Grade II student Ramsey Chung, on the mound, Mount Carmel set its sights on winning its fourth ROPSSAA title and securing another entrance into the OFSAA Finals the following week. The game started with St. Martin taking an early I-O lead, but Carmel quickly responded with its own run to tie the game.

The middle innings saw St. Martin take the lead with a home run by one of their many talented players. Carmel quickly countered with a home run of its own by Grade 12 student Cameron Tomcko to even it back up again. In the same inning, Carmel scored another run to take the lead. The seventh and final inning featured controversy when an overturned call—which should have ended the game—allowed St. Martin to tie the score. Ramsey finished the inning with his 13th strikeout of the game, leaving their player, and the winning run, stranded at third.

In what can be described as one of the most exciting high school games many have witnessed, Grade 10 student Hayden Stewart launched a three-run home run in extra innings to take the lead. Jameson Mañebo, a new Grade 9 player, came into the game in relief of Ramsey to try to secure the win. Jameson kept his composure and proceeded to retire the side in the bottom of the 8th inning to seal the victory, Carmel's fourth title, and ticket to OFSAA Championship.

Although another OFSAA Gold medal was not their destiny this year, Carmel competed well in the Regionals and lost to the eventual Gold Medal team St. Peter's C.S.S.

Congratulations are still in order to all the players and coaches on a successful and enjoyable 2025 season! To Graduating players - Onward and upward.







A FOND FAREWELL TO MR. MCLEVEY

Since arriving at Our Lady of Mount Carmel in 2021, Mr. McLevey has left a lasting impact on our school community. His presence was felt from the very beginning — through his warmth, his deep sense of faith, and his ability to bring people together.

One of Mr. McLevey's most visible and impactful contributions has been the beautiful school masses he organized. With care and attention, he created inclusive and prayerful liturgies that allowed students to fully participate — whether through music, scripture readings, or prayer. These mass celebrations were more than just a school event — they became moments of unity, reflection, and deep spiritual connection for our community. Behind the scenes, these masses required preparation, and Mr. McLevey carried this out with dedication and grace.



Mr. McLevey led powerful school-wide initiatives that reflected his commitment to service and social justice. The Day of Hope saw 130 students serve at 13 community organizations across the GTA, offering hands-on help and spreading hope through small, meaningful acts. During Holy Week, the Who's Hungry event brought 60 students together to experience and reflect on hunger, fostering empathy and community. These initiatives are examples of Mr. McLevey's gift for turning faith and justice into lived experiences.





Mr. McLevey organized two student service trips to the Yukon in 2023 and 2025. These experiences combined service, faith, and adventure in a way students will never forget. While there, students helped renovate Camp Braeburn, a children's summer camp, and took part in nightly spiritual reflections around the campfire. The journey also included visits to Destruction Bay, the Arctic Research Centre, and Haines Junction; a hike through the breathtaking Kluane National Park, and time spent exploring Silver City, a historic Yukon Gold Rush town. These trips offered students the chance to serve, reflect, and connect with one another and with the land in deeply meaningful ways — all made possible through Mr. McLevey's vision and leadership.
